Dear Friends,


As I travel Maine, I hear from people who live in every corner of our state. I hear about their achievements, their successes, their work to improve their communities – I hear about the hope they have for our state. I also hear about our challenges, and all the work we have left to do. As I see it, that's my job: to listen to you, act where I can to build on what's good, and work on the tough parts. As 2018 comes to a close, I wanted to take a moment to share an update on some of the work we're doing in Washington to lift up the accomplishments of Maine people and make progress on the challenges they face.

From Portland to Presque Isle, from Milo to Camden, I hear about the pain that the opioid epidemic is inflicting on Maine communities. I've met with Maine people in recovery, family members of those struggling with substance use disorders, treatment providers, and law enforcement officials to learn about their experiences with this terrible disease, and everyone agrees that in order to fully respond to these problems, we need a stronger federal effort to end the opioid epidemic. Fortunately, some help is on the way – in October, we overwhelmingly passed a sweeping, bipartisan opioids bill. I've pushed hard for this type of legislation and was proud to have provisions I've advocated for included in the bill. These priorities have been guided by the voices of Maine people, and we'll keep working to confront this tragic problem.

I've also worked to strengthen the future of our forest economy. Maine's forests have powered our state's economy for generations, especially in our rural communities. So, when rapid shifts in the market led to the closure of many pulp and paper mills and biomass power plants, it required a collaborative approach to support future growth in this important industry. That's why, together with the other members of the state's Congressional delegation, I pushed to establish the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT). This integrated, multiagency effort aims to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy, and we're already seeing the benefits: in recent months, several forest industry businesses have announced significant investments into Maine operations, and in September 2018, the Forest Opportunity Roadmap (FOR)/Maine released an action plan to make sure this industry, and the rural communities it supports, can continue to thrive for generations to come.

As I close this letter, please allow me to express my gratitude to each of you – for your dedication to our state, and to one another. It's often said that Maine is like a big small town (with very long streets)—that's because at our heart, we're one big community. It's not only a pleasure to serve you— it's a pleasure to know you. Thank you for being the reason Maine is so special. Mary and I hope that 2019 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and our great State.

Dear Friends,

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our state have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, I worked to help ensure the well-being of our seniors. The *SeniorSafe Act I* authored became law last year and is empowering banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions to better protect seniors from financial fraud.

Following extensive committee investigations of prescription drug pricing, additional legislation I crafted became law, ending the egregious practice of pharmacy “gag clauses” that prevented pharmacists from informing patients on how to pay the lowest possible price.

This year, I was also successful in securing an extra \$425 million for Alzheimer’s research—the largest funding increase ever—bringing the total to \$2.34 billion. Additionally, the bipartisan *BOLD Act I* authored will create public health infrastructure to combat Alzheimer’s by promoting education, early diagnosis, and improved care management.

More than 40 million Americans—including 178,000 Mainers—are caregivers for parents, spouses, children, and other loved ones with disabilities or illnesses, such as Alzheimer’s. The *RAISE Family Caregivers Act I* authored was signed into law last year, giving caregivers more resources and training to better balance the full-time job of caregiving. Another law I wrote will help grandparents who are raising grandchildren, largely due to the opioid addiction crisis.

In addition to helping seniors, a major accomplishment over the past year is the increased federal investment in biomedical research that is leading to progress in the fight against numerous devastating diseases. Congress has boosted funding for the National Institutes of Health by \$7 billion in just the last three years, bringing total funding to more than \$39 billion.

One of my highest priorities as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee is to improve our nation’s crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine’s needs are addressed. Since the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Grants program, formerly known as TIGER, was established in 2009, I have secured \$160 million for vital transportation projects throughout Maine.

Congress also delivered a Farm Bill last year, which includes many important provisions that will help the agriculture industry in Maine and across the country. Specifically, I secured provisions that will strengthen support for young farmers, improve local farm-to-market efforts, and increase funding for organic research.


Congress took decisive action to address the opioid addiction epidemic. In addition to appropriating \$8.5 billion in federal funding last year, Congress enacted the *SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act*, a comprehensive package that embraces the multipronged approach I have long advocated for this epidemic: prevention, treatment, recovery, and enforcement to stop drug trafficking.

Maine plays a key role in ensuring a strong national defense. In 2018, Congress provided funding for five ships to be built at Bath Iron Works, which will help to keep our nation safe and provide our skilled shipbuilders a steady job. I also secured more than \$162 million for infrastructure projects at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to support their important work to overhaul Navy submarines.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2018, I cast my 6,834th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

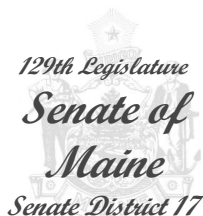

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

First, let me thank you for electing me to represent you in Augusta. I am honored to get to serve you in the Maine Senate. It has been a privilege serving as a State Representative over the last eight years. I will continue to work tirelessly on your behalf, making sure your interests are heard and well represented in the Maine Legislature.

This past legislative session proved to be the longest in recent memory. After dealing with a number of major policy matters, we finally adjourned September 13.

Perhaps the most significant action the Legislature took last year was the passage of tax conformity. TO: The Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Industry

With the adoption of the updated Shoreland Zoning Ordinance at the 2018 Town Meeting the Planning Board and I began applying the new standards to projects in the Shoreland area. As with any ordinance change there has been a learning curve, but overall the administration and enforcement to the ordinance seem to have gone well.

I met with property owners and contractors and assisted them with the preparation of Building Setback and Shoreland Zoning permit applications. I also answered questions on subdivision development and the requirements of the Floodplain Management Ordinance.

In 2018 I continued to attend Planning Board meetings and to respond to any complaints about potential violations of local ordinances or Maine environmental laws. If anyone has concerns about a land use project please let me know and I will inspect the project to make sure it has the proper permits.

During the year, as E-911 Addressing Officer, I assigned new street numbers and street names to keep the Town current with the E-911 addressing standards. All E-911 changes are now done electronically, but actual measurements have to be conducted in the field before the information can be put into the computer.

If you have questions about the Town's land use ordinances, E-911 addressing, or believe there is a violation of the ordinances or just need assistance, please contact me at 684-4111. I am also frequently in the municipal building so you can also leave a message for me there.

Fire Chief's Report for 2018

To: The Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Industry

Our department has seen some changes over the year. We were requested to other towns for mutual aid a few more times. This is probably going to increase as time goes on, as it is a trend in needing help with fires when there is not enough personnel in any local department.

In 2018, the breakdowns of calls are as follows:

EMS Calls	34
Brush Fires	3
Chimney Fires	1
Motor Vehicle Crashes	6
Mutual Aid to Other Towns	9
Downed Powerlines	6
Vehicle Fires	1
Other (CO, Boat Call, Smoke Investigations)	7

In 2019, we have one member attending the Emergency Medical Responder course and will gain their EMS license in the spring, while others will be finishing their firefighter certifications for the first time. We are still in the process of looking into purchasing a gently used fire pumper to replace our 32 year old truck, which is starting to develop major problems, especially in the pump. Due to this fact, we will begin looking at other grant funding for help in modernizing our fire equipment and replacing outdated items before they become unsafe. We have also received word from the ME Forest Service, that we received a grant to purchase some much needed forest fire equipment.

As with most fire departments across Maine and the United States, we are faced with decreased numbers in volunteers. Our department answers not only fire based calls, but also emergency medical ones. Anyone who is interested in helping out their town and willing to volunteer, are welcome to attend one of our meetings (1st and 3rd Monday of each month) at our station to see what it is all about. We are always looking for folks to help.

Plumbing Inspector's Report
For 2018

TO: The Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Industry

The Maine Subsurface Wastewater Disposal Rules require that a permit be issued for all septic system installations and that the Plumbing Inspector conduct a minimum of two inspections during the construction of the system. Also, the Maine Internal Plumbing Code requires that a permit must be issued, by the Plumbing Inspector, for most interior plumbing and that plumbing also has to be inspected.

In 2018, I issued seventeen plumbing permits. Eleven were for septic systems and six were for interior plumbing.

Enforcement of the State septic system and interior plumbing rules did not require legal action by the Town and any problems identified were corrected.

Vital Records

Certified copies of most vital records (birth, marriage and death certificates) may be obtained at the Industry Town Office for \$15 for the first copy and \$6 for each additional copy.

Intentions of Marriage are also filed at the Town Office; the application fee is \$40.00. If either party has been married before, a certified copy of documentation showing how the last marriage ended is required. Once Intentions have been filed a marriage license may be issued immediately and is valid for 90 days. It is strongly recommended to plan ahead and make an appointment when obtaining a marriage license. Please do not wait until the last minute as it takes approximately 30 minutes to complete the process.

Elections

Residents who are eligible to vote may register at the Town Office during regular business hours or at the polls on Election Day. Proof of residency is required at the time of registration. If this is your first time registering to vote in Maine, you must also bring proof of identification, such as a driver's license or other photo ID. Seventeen-year-olds may register to vote if they will be eighteen before the next Election Day. Only registered voters may vote at Town Meetings and at the polls.

In Maine, a registered voter may vote by absentee ballot for any reason. Absentee ballots are available 30 days before an election, and voters can request a ballot in person at the Town Office, by mail, by phone, or on the internet from the Secretary of State's website. Immediate family members may request a ballot on behalf of a family member in person or by mail.

Dog Licenses

All dogs 6 months of age or older are required by State law to be licensed on or before January 1st of each year. In order to license a dog in Maine you will need a current Maine Certificate of Rabies Vaccination. If your dog is spayed or neutered, the first time you license him, a neutering/spaying certificate from the veterinarian is needed. If you fail to license your dog, you will be subject to a State mandated late fee and possible summons to court by a police officer. If your dog is no longer living or is not in your possession any longer, kindly advise this office so that our records may be corrected. Dog licenses may be obtained from the Town Office or online. Fees are as follows: Unaltered: \$11.00 Spayed or Neutered: \$6.00. A \$25.00 late fee will be charged after January 31st.

Notes of Procedure

The **Moderator presides over Town Meeting** in accordance with MRSA Title 30-A §2524. The Moderator further facilitates the meeting in accordance with MMA's **Maine Moderators Manual**

Registered Voters must check in

- **Procedure:** The Moderator will read each article aloud and ask if someone will make a motion on the article; usually someone will respond “so moved”, then “second”. The Moderator will then open discussion on the motion.
- **Amendments:** an amendment may be motioned and seconded to propose a change to an article; please note capped articles with specific monetary amount(s) contained in the wording are limited in that they can only be decreased not increased. If an amendment does not pass, then the original motion is voted upon. Ordinances cannot be amended from the floor.
- **Voting:** The Moderator will ask for a show of hands, if required - please keep your hand raised until the Moderator (and his/her designees) have concluded counting. A vote for “all in favor” means - yes, you want the motion to pass, “all those opposed” means - no, you want the motion to fail.
- **Challenges:** A voter who wishes to challenge the Moderator’s determination should immediately seek to be recognized and state “*I doubt it*”: if at least six other voters agree; the Moderator will make the determination more certain by using a designated other method of voting.
- **Written Ballots:** any voter can move an article to be voted on by written ballot any time before the article is voted upon, the motion must be seconded; no discussion is allowed before voting on the motion to vote by written ballot.
- **If you wish to speak on an article:** wait until the Moderator has opened the floor to public comment discussion; raise your hand - when the Moderator has recognized you, proceed:
 - State your name for the record & whom you represent if applicable.
 - Direct commentary or questions directly to the Moderator.
 - State your business in a brief & concise manner; relevant to the current article/motion.
 - The Moderator has the right to set a time limit for comments, and overall on a motion.
- **Order, Prohibitions:**
 - The Moderator will not entertain public comment about specific individuals.
 - Personal or accusatory comments are *out of order*; comments should be respectful and courteous.
 - Disorderly conduct, profanity, threatening or aggressive language or gestures; are *out of order*.
 - At no time will the public be allowed to argue, debate or introduce a topic that is not on the agenda.
 - Voters & attendees may not speak during Town Meeting unless recognized by the Moderator: the audience shall not disturb the proceedings by whispering, talking or otherwise engaging in other distractions. Cellular phones must be turned off; with the exception of emergency responders.
 - If any person, after a *command for order* by the Moderator, continues to act in a disorderly manner, the Moderator may direct that person to leave the meeting. If the person refuses to leave, the Moderator may have that person removed until the meeting is adjourned.

Greetings: In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Industry, qualified by the law to vote in said Town affairs, to meet in the Industry Town Hall, 1033 Industry Road, in said Town on the **9th day of March 2019 AD** at 7:45 AM to act on the following articles.

Article 1 To elect a moderator to preside at said Meeting.

Article 2 The polls will be open from 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM at the Industry Town Hall to choose by Secret ballot one Selectman who shall be the Assessor and Overseer of the Poor. The remaining business to be transacted under this Warrant will be taken up at 2 PM in the afternoon.

Article 3 To see if the Town will vote to ratify all overdrafts for the year 2018.

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to authorize all abatements that are granted, charged to the Overlay account.

Article 5 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to seize and dispose of any property acquired by the town for nonpayment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute Quitclaim Deeds for such property.

Article 6 To see if the town will vote to increase the property tax levy limit of **\$307,567.00**. Established for the Town Of Industry by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved under the following articles will result in a tax commitment that is greater than the property tax levy limit.
