Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to reflect on 2020, an incredibly challenging year for Maine families, small businesses, and communities.

When the pandemic struck, our country faced the specter of an overwhelmed health care system and devastation to our small businesses and the millions of people they employ. I immediately worked with Republicans and Democrats to pass multiple laws allocating approximately \$3 trillion to respond to this public health and economic crisis, including more than \$8 billion directed to Maine to support testing, schools, the economy, and other purposes — that is nearly double Maine’s annual state budget.

I am especially proud of the bipartisan Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) I co-authored. This program has provided three out of four Maine small businesses with nearly \$2.3 billion in forgivable loans, which has helped sustain more than 250,000 Maine jobs. I have met thousands of Maine small employers and employees in all 16 counties who are surviving because of the PPP. As one small business owner told me, the PPP provided “exactly what we needed at exactly the right time.” The PPP also allowed employers to maintain benefits, such as health care, during this challenging time. Another round of PPP is needed to sustain small businesses and their employees.

While the pandemic continues across Maine, our nation, and the world, I thank the first responders, health care professionals, teachers, grocery store employees, factory workers, farmers, truck drivers, postal employees, and so many others who continue to stay on the job during this difficult time. With the deployment of the first vaccines, better tests, and the incredible speed with which these life-saving responses were developed, I am hopeful we can emerge from this crisis in the next few months.

While providing relief to American families was my focus throughout 2020, other accomplishments include the passage of the Great American Outdoors Act, which provides full funding of the Land and Water Conservation Fund and addresses the maintenance backlog at our national parks, forests, and wildlife refuges. As Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, in 2020 alone, I secured \$132 million to improve Maine’s roads, bridges, airports, buses, rail, ferries, and seaports. Finally, as Chairman of the Aging Committee, I led the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, which funds programs that improve the well-being, independence, and health of our nation’s seniors and their caregivers, and I authored laws to reduce the cost of prescription drugs and protect individuals with Alzheimer’s disease.

As the end of 2020 is approaching, I have cast more than 7,535 votes, never having missed one. In the New Year, my focus remains to work with colleagues to find common ground on policies to help support the health and safety of Mainers and the safe, responsible opening of our communities. If ever I or my staff can be of assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact one of my state offices. May the coming year be a successful one for you, your family, your community, and our state.

Dear Friends,

2020 was a year unlike any in our lifetimes. Our state and nation dealt with unprecedented challenges--the coronavirus pandemic, ensuing economic fallout, and a prolonged, heavily divisive campaign season each took a significant toll on all of us. The worst part? In order to protect each other, we had to face these challenges in isolation. But a new year represents new possibilities; a chance to take stock of what we're grateful for and focus on the opportunities in front of us. As we reflect back on 2020, we will remember heartbreak and loss – but we cannot forget the shining rays of hope that broke through the darkness, reminding us all that better days are ahead.

Throughout the pandemic, my top focus has been on bridging the partisan divide in Washington in order to deliver desperately-needed relief for Maine people. Joined by colleagues last March, we pushed for bipartisan negotiations to produce a strong bill that helped fellow Mainers, businesses, and institutions weather this storm. In the weeks and months after the *CARES Act* passed, our team stayed in close contact with people throughout the state to determine how we should adjust our response to best support our citizens. Unfortunately, the aid provided by the *CARES Act* lapsed without Congressional action, leaving too many families and businesses in limbo. I never stopped pushing for a bipartisan relief bill and, after extensive negotiations, we ended the year on a good note by breaking the gridlock and passing new relief legislation. This new bill isn't perfect; in fact, it should just be the start our renewed response. As we enter 2021 with a new administration and new Congress, we must fight for additional legislation to help restore stability to our working families and rebuild our economy and public health infrastructure.

In the midst of this crisis, Congress did manage to accomplish a few successes that will outlast this awful pandemic. Among these was the *Great American Outdoors Act*, a bipartisan bill which was enacted into law in August 2020 and will help address a \$12 billion backlog at our national parks so future generations of Americans can enjoy these beautiful lands and create lifelong memories. Also, as we learn more about the recent hacks of our nation's networks, there is help on the way: 27 of the cybersecurity recommendations made by the Cyberspace Solarium Commission – which I co-chair with Republican Congressman Mike Gallagher– made it into this year's defense bill. While there is no guarantee that these provisions would have prevented the massive hack, they will certainly improve our cyber defenses.

Despite the challenges, I'm hopeful for the future. Vaccines are being distributed across our state – starting with our healthcare heroes, who have sacrificed so much throughout this unprecedented catastrophe and deserve our eternal gratitude. If there can be a silver lining from these challenges of 2020, maybe it will be this: I hope that, in the not-so distant future, we will be able to come together physically and we will be reminded of our love for each other. We have differences, without a doubt. But as Maine people stepped up to support each other, we saw again and again that our differences pale in comparison to the values we share. We are one state, and one community – and there is nothing we cannot or will not do for each other. Mary and I wish you a happy and healthy 2021. We can't wait to see you soon.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. I know that this year has been challenging for many of our communities. In the midst of these challenges, it remains a privilege to represent you, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on in Congress for the people of the Second Congressional District.

The coronavirus pandemic has made this year an especially difficult one. We've seen the struggles of small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, and states and towns. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. In March, Congress passed the largest of three bipartisan pieces of relief legislation, the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act*. The *CARES Act* was a \$2 trillion economic relief package to provide immediate assistance for some of those hit hardest by the pandemic. While an important start, many of the programs and benefits created by the *CARES Act* were set to expire by the end of 2020 at a time when COVID-19 cases were on the rise. That's why in late December, Congress passed another bipartisan bill to provide COVID-19 relief to small businesses and hospitals, the unemployed, and families struggling to put food on the table. However, the action Congress took at the end of 2020 cannot distract from its failure to act sooner. The unwillingness of many members of Congress to accept compromise throughout the fall left many Mainers struggling and led to a rushed process that produced a bill with serious flaws. In 2021, Congress needs to step up, come together, and lead the country through this pandemic and get our economy back on track.

There are a few bright spots that came out of the work done by Congress this year. As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I helped advocate for a national defense bill that would include important priorities for American national security, Maine shipbuilders, and servicemembers and their families. The legislation authorizes a new DDG-51 Arleigh Burke-class destroyer to be constructed at Bath Iron Works and helps BIW compete for new work by encouraging a new multi-year procurement process for the DDG-51 Flight III. This funding bill also makes permanent new federal guidelines proposed by Senator King and me to allow Gold Star Families free admission to national parks and other federal lands.

I've been working to improve mental health services for veterans for years, and I led the Maine delegation's effort to address the need for long-term mental health substance abuse treatment for veterans in our state. This past fall the Veterans Administration announced we were successful. Construction starts next year on a new, 24-bed facility at Togus that will ensure Maine veterans won't be sent out of state to receive residential care for substance use disorder and associated mental health issues. This is one result that I am especially proud to deliver for my fellow Maine veterans.

As I reflect upon what I am most grateful for this year, I am especially glad to be able to share that my wife Izzy and I are expecting a baby in 2021. We are excited about this new addition to our family and look forward to the blessings ahead.

This period is challenging for Mainers as we all take steps to limit the spread of the coronavirus, protect our families and our communities, and lean on each other to withstand this pandemic and economic hardship. My staff and I stand ready to assist Mainers as we work through these challenges together. I look forward to continuing to work on your behalf in 2021.

It has been a pleasure to serve the residents of House District #114 in the Maine Legislature. I am honored that you have entrusted me again with this responsibility. As you are aware, these past ten months have brought unprecedented challenges to our country, the State of Maine and our communities.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the second session of the 129th Legislature adjourned *Sine Die* on March 17, 2020. The opening on December 2 of the 130th Legislature was still impacted by the pandemic and to ensure social distancing, the *Swearing In* was held at the Augusta Civic Center instead of the chambers in the State House.

## Elections

This election year was the busiest we have ever seen. Not only did we have our first Presidential Primary in March instead of a caucus, we also had a Presidential election during a pandemic. New guidelines were changing and added almost daily regarding the election process this year due to the pandemic. I was fortunate to have several residents volunteer to join our election team this year to help with the additional duties. I have a great group of election clerks that ensure our elections run smoothly. I appreciated all the hours and hard work they put into each election.

Absentee ballots are available 30 days before an election, and voters may request a ballot in person at the Town Office, by mail, by phone, or online from the Secretary of State's website. Immediate family members may request a ballot on behalf of a family member in person or by mail.

If you plan to expand a non-conforming building in the SLZ please contact me so that I can assist you in the preparation of the application.

In 2020 I attended Planning Board meetings and responded to any complaints about potential violations of local ordinances or Maine environmental laws. If anyone has concerns about a land use project please let me know and I will inspect the project to make sure it has the proper permits.

As the Town's E-911 Addressing Officer, I assigned new street numbers and street names to keep the Town current with the E-911 addressing standards. While all E-911 changes are now done via computer, actual measurements still have to be conducted in the field before the information can be entered into the database.

# Fire Chief

To: The Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Industry

During these troubled and uncertain times our department has seen some changes over the year. Mutual aid agreements continue to be a big part of our calls, with the lack of manpower still being an issue with all departments. EMS calls were a lot less this year due to precautions with personnel and obtaining the proper amount of PPE.

In 2020, the breakdowns of calls are as follows:

We have a few new members this year, as well as a new first responder who successfully completed the EMS class last fall, we welcomed Rachel Arsenault to the First Responders in our department. We are still striving to train, completing Cold Water Rescue training, basic firefighting, and SCBA training. We are looking forward to utilizing the new training facility in Farmington this year.

We have encountered mechanical issues with our 25 year old Squad truck this year, causing the need to have it towed for repairs. It is a substantial amount of money to complete the rest of the needed repairs, so we have been limiting the use of the truck. We are in the process of looking into purchasing a gently used fire pumper to replace our 32 year old Engine and our 25 year old Squad truck.

As with most fire departments across Maine and the United States, we are faced with decreased numbers in volunteers. Our department answers not only fire based calls, but also emergency medical ones. Anyone who is interested in helping out their town and willing to volunteer, are welcome to attend one of our meetings (1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday of each month) at our station to see what it is all about. We are always looking for folks to help.

# Plumbing Inspector

TO: The Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Industry

The Maine Subsurface Wastewater Disposal Rules require that a permit be issued for all septic system installations and that the Plumbing Inspector conduct a minimum of two inspections during the construction of the system. Also, the Maine Internal Plumbing Code requires that a permit must be issued by the Plumbing Inspector for most interior plumbing and that plumbing also has to be inspected.

In 2020, I issued seven plumbing permits. Three were for septic systems and four were for internal plumbing.

Enforcement of the State septic system and internal plumbing rules did not require legal action by the Town and any problems identified were corrected.

## Lovejoy-Witherly Endowment

Robert A. Witherly bequeathed a trust fund to the Town of Industry in which he named the Lovejoy-Witherly Endowment. On August 1, 2017 the Town voted to accept the trust that the Board of Selectmen now oversee.

The Lovejoy-Witherly Endowment is available for residents of Industry who are 60 years of age or older who are in need of paying their utility expenses and/or real estate taxes. The amount of no less than \$2,000.00 per year but no more than \$3,000.00 per year are to be expended for this purpose. The intent is to help multiple people and not the same ones every year.

The Clearwater Food Pantry serves the communities of Industry, Chesterville and New Sharon. We would like to thank the Town of Industry and its Selectmen for their support of the pantry. They make sure the pantry is plowed out during winter weather so patrons and those delivering donations can safely access the pantry. They also take care of the lawn during the summer months. For this support we are grateful. The town of Chesterville supported the pantry with a \$500 donation and the New Sharon United Methodist Church collects and donates items to the pantry on a regular basis. We also need to acknowledge Hannaford for their weekly "rescue donations" of bakery items, produce, meat, deli, dairy and eggs. Shorey Chapel has supported the pantry with filled back packs, and snack items during school vacations for children, as well as monetary support. We have also received individual donations of cash, food, and personal care items. Without these generous donations we couldn't keep the food flowing into the community to families in need.

**To:** *Joseph Paradis, Jr.*, resident of the Town of Industry, County of Franklin, State of Maine.

**Greetings:** In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Industry, qualified by the law to vote in said Town affairs, to meet in the Industry Town Hall, 1033 Industry Road, in said Town on the 13<sup>th</sup> **day of March 2021 AD** at 7:45 AM to act on the following articles.

**Article 1** To elect a moderator to preside at said Meeting.

**Article 2** The polls will be open from 8:00 AM to 12:30 AM at the Industry Town Hall to choose by Secret ballot one Selectman who shall be the Assessor and Overseer of the Poor. The remaining business to be transacted under this Warrant will be taken up at 2 PM in the afternoon.

**Article 3** To see if the Town will vote to ratify all overdrafts for the year 2020.

**Article 4** To see if the Town will vote to authorize all abatements that are granted, charged to the Overlay account.

**Article 5** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to seize and dispose of any property acquired by the town for nonpayment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable, and to execute Quitclaim Deeds for such property.

**Article 6** To see if the town will vote to increase the property tax levy limit of **\$348,568.00** Established for the Town Of Industry by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved under the following articles will result in a tax commitment that is greater than the property tax levy limit.

*Note. If all the articles in this warrant were to pass at the requested amount, the total tax levy would be **\$316,020.00**. **\$32,548.00** under the 2021 Property Tax Levy Limit.*

**Article 7** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Municipal Officers to spend an amount not to exceed 3/12 of the budgeted amount in each budget category of the 2021 annual budget during the period from January 1, 2022 to the 2022 Annual Town Meeting.

- Article 8** To see if the Town will vote to make all property taxes due and payable October 1, 2021 upon that day they will become delinquent thereafter, and that the interest on said delinquent taxes shall be the maximum rate of interest that can be charged per Title 36, M.R.S.A. Section 505.4. (6%)
- Article 9** To see if the town will vote to authorize the tax collector to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed, pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. Section 506.
- Article 10** To see if the Town will vote to accept any gifts, unanticipated donations, or pass-through funds that may be provided by individual(s), business associations, charitable groups, or other organizations, which have not been listed in any of the previous or following articles and to raise and appropriate funds for the purpose for which they were given, if the Selectmen determine that the gifts, donations, or pass-through funds and their purposes are in the best interest of the Town.
- Article 11** To see if the Town will vote to transfer the Maine State Snowmobile registration reimbursement funds to the Northen-Lites Snowmobile Club.
- Article 12** To see if the Town will vote to pay to the Plumbing Inspector 50% of the fees that he collects in the year 2021.  
*(25% State, 25% Town, 50% Plumbing Inspector)*
- Article 13** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$8,649.00** and to contract with Franklin Memorial Hospital, NorthStar Emergency Medical Service, for the term of one year.
- Article 14** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$3,200.00** for the Animal Control Officer. *(\$2,500.00 salary \$200.00 payroll taxes \$500 mileage)*
- Article 15** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$2,043.00** and to contract with the Franklin County Animal Shelter for the term of one year.
- Article 16** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,000.00** for debt service.  
*(interest on the tax anticipation loan)*
- Article 17** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer of the \$11,232.74 unexpended balance of the 2020 Fire Department Budget to the Fire Equipment Reserve account.
- Article 18** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of Selectmen with the guidance of the fire Department, to purchase a new / used firefighting apparatus at a price not to exceed \$125,000.00.

*To be funded as follows: \$17,404.00 from Equipment Reserve, \$11,232.74 from the 2020 fire department budget, \$46,363.26 from Taxation. The remaining balance of \$50,000.00 to be financed over the next five years.*
